Mahalo to everyone who served on the task force. You contributed a lot of good time, energy, thoughts, feelings and input on the committee. Appreciate that you found the time to contribute.

Running through activities as a refresher -

Ka'ika'i Core Commitments – priorities as set by the UH system. Waiting on Strategic Plan at the CC level; recent insight from Della Teraoka, Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs, on priorities. More info coming soon.

First four priorities have historically been important to the college system. How do we want to approach in a way that is unique to Hawai'i CC, Hawai'i island and the people we serve? Education, workforce, reskill building, workforce development.

Focusing on the fifth item - Ka'ika'i Kauhale: "Maintaining\* the Well-being of the Community College," is what our

Kauhale chose to elevate for ourselves - it is Important at this time in our history and evolution.

\*Last time you'll see "maintain" wording – going forward will change to Build, Develop, Raise, Grow: based on Kauhale input.

Team held a field trip to learn history of Hilo and history of leadership decisions in the Hilo area.

Discussions following field trip:

- What do we want for our Kauhale? Positive campus culture. What does that mean?
- What do we do to achieve and measure this? What does it *look* like when you're doing it and what does it *feel* like when you're doing it?
- Themes taken from input during dreamstorming and imagineering exercises; summarized responses.

How do you turn ideas into action? Through behaviors; providing more communication, information, opportunities for connection, training; giving others the benefit of the doubt that everyone would choose to do their best. Clifton Strengths was recommended. List of suggestions provided in presentation.

Incredible resource in our Hawaiian Lifestyles folks; beautiful facilitators of activities such as ho'oponopono. We should act as not just an indigenous serving institution, but an indigenous informed institution and learn how to heal, grow, develop and have difficult conversations in the indigenous way. Ask Ho'olulu Council and team from Hawaiian Lifestyles and Hawaiian cultural activities to help guide.

How do we know if it's working? More important to look at how the Kauhale are experiencing it. How are people feeling? Showing up? Are too many leaving? Not enough applying? Looking at all these things is important.

Padlet activity at year end celebration. Main aspects, themes came out:

- How do we prioritize the personal health and wellbeing of the Kauhale members?
- How are they managing work-life balance?
- How are they doing on a personal level with psychological, emotional and physical capability to engage in their professional work? If basic needs aren't being met, then they cannot contribute their best to the Kauhale, and we cannot expect them to.

What does it look like to do the work that prioritizes well-being? Positive campus culture – all relationships across campus. How do we treat each other and interact? Theme: We should prioritize the activities and investments that contribute to positive campus culture.

Campus beautification came up – progress in repainting buildings, maintenance, landscape clean up, everything contributes to a healthy Kauhale environment.

Community engagement piece – have a reciprocal partnership so they feel that Hawai'i CC is part of the community and vice versa. When 'community' is in your name, you can't do enough. There's an expectation to be engaged in the community or invite more ideas in this area.

"Top Actionable Items" and ideas - "Moving Forward" slide

## Look at:

- What we do well and should continue doing celebrate our strengths
- What needs to be mended in order for folks to be able to move forward in a healthy way?
- What do we need to cease doing? Limited amount of time, energy and capacity to focus on our priorities

"Suggestion for Next Activity" slide - Kei-Lin suggested following up on discussions to revisit the Mission and Vision statements for the College; recommends a third-party consultant who can walk the Kauhale through its strategic plan.

Chair DuPuis shared that our ALO Kalani Flores has taken the lead on Mission/Vision conversations; we needed confirmation of that for the accreditation report due in mid-

	spring 2024. Once there is a formal strategic plan to align to, the Council will be required to vote to adopt/approve. It is one of the core items that the Council has specific kuleana to approve.  No questions on the presentation.  Chair DuPuis: Thank you to Kei-Lin, Taupouri Tangarō, and Ākea Kiyuna for leading this initiative and for everybody who contributed as well.

**Comment,** Brenda Watanabe responding as Chair of FSDC: Faculty/Staff Development Committee (FSDC) is

still working on the schedule for Convocation Week, so they can adjust other activities based on proposed change to the All-College Meeting schedule.

**Comment,** Chair DuPuis: asked all to consider other conflicts with trainings or onboardings or any other meetings.

**Comment,** Christine Quintana: we may want to consider changing the spring All-College Meeting to Thursday on a regular basis.

**Comment,** Chancellor Kazama: this may be a rare occasion for this to happen due to the semester starting early and the Monday holiday.

**Comment,** Jana Smith: it can be challenging preparing for the start of a semester after a break and prefers later in Convocation Week for the All-College Meeting.

**Comment,** Toni Cravens-Howell: For mainland travel - \$3,000 seems low. Suggest that in a year or two, the policy could be adjusted? See if it's meeting the needs of mainland travel.

**Comment,** Chair DuPuis: Exceptions could be made by the Chancellor. Notes that all policies are reviewed every 5 years.

**Comment,** Toni Cravens-Howell: Good to know there are exceptions. Get the policy in place and maybe adjust in the review cycle.

**Comment**, Anjeanette Oberg: Suggest to revise wording from 'mainland' to 'continent'.

**Comment,** Anjeanette Oberg: (in chat): Mahalo everyone. It is a small detail, but centers the 'āina, consistent with the other values you have been discussing today.

The team considered sister campus policies. Some have 4-tiers (warning, probation, suspension, dismissal). Some just have probation into continued probation and then dismissal. 3 campuses had one model and 3 had another.

Sherise Tiogangco, Kenoa Dela Cruz, and Karen Crowell were on the policy review subcommittee then went to Student Affairs for review and to the Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs (VCSA).

The subcommittee took out continued Probation – if you're on probation then you're on probation; added one other level of Suspension. Escalation as follows:

If cumulative GPA is less than 2.0 any semester, student is placed on Academic Warning.

If a student's cumulative is less than 2.0 following a semester on Academic Warning, they will be placed on Probation.

If a student's cumulative is less than 2.0 following a semester on Probation, they will be placed on Suspension.

 Readmission is allowed after one semester off or through an approved appeal (submitted to VCSA within 10 days of notification).

If Suspension occurs and then student receives a GPA below 2.0 again, they will be dismissed for one year.

**Question,** Chair DuPuis: How does this impact financial aid?

**Response**, Kenoa Dela Cruz: This policy is different than the financial aid satisfactory academic progress policy. Depends if they're a certificate student or AA/AS student. Each situation is unique so we can't say more clearly.

**Comment**, Chair DuPuis: So, there *may* be a financial aid impact.

**Response**, Kenoa Dela Cruz: Absolutely, yes, it impacts financial aid. There are standards that must be met to continue receiving financial aid, separate from this academic policy.

**Response**, Kate DeSoto: The language in this policy doesn't alter when or how the financial aid implications would happen.

**Comment**, Grace Funai (in chat): But these labels don't affect financial aid in the same way. As long as the financial aid GPA is below 2.0, the student is suspended from financial aid.

**Response**, Kenoa Dela Cruz: Next draft will remove 'federally sponsored' wording and will say, "Note: Financial aid programs define satisfactory academic progress differently."

**Comment**, Chair DuPuis: This is the first reading, please take this back to your constituents. These changes are substantial and the Kauhale is encouraged to review carefully.

**Comment**, Grace Funai: Thank you to Kenoa and the committee for your hard work on this. Food for thought - brought this up at the next Counseling meeting.

- Suggest to streamline/reduce levels.
- We don't really dismiss students. Propose to remove Dismissal, just use Suspension.
  - Student can always file an appeal to come back. We can change the amount of time we ask them to sit out.
- All of this is a permanent record on a student's academic record; don't know that we need a warning. Not feeling strong on that.
- The fewer levels we have, the easier to explain to students; easier for us to keep in mind.

**Comment**, Sherise Tiogangco: Along the same lines of what Grace mentioned, consider verbiage along with action.

- Maybe Warning is not necessary, but when they go into Probation, the student should be made aware.
- Before, we didn't have an indication that this could lead to something serious.

- Dismissal language should be consistent across the System. Most campuses have Dismissal.
  - o Dismissal and Expulsion are different.
- Provides an opportunity for us to have some intervention with the students at various points through the steps

**Comment**, Jana Smith: Requests a revised draft to share with our constituencies ahead of the next Council meeting.

**Comment**, Chair DuPuis: If a revised draft is ready a week prior to Jan. 12 CoCo meeting, it can be shared when the agenda goes out. Subcommittee will work on revisions for 2<sup>nd</sup> reading at the January CoCo meeting; 3<sup>rd</sup> reading and possibly the final vote at the February meeting.

**Comment**, Sherise Tiogangco: We would prefer to approve to implement it next academic year ('24-'25) so transcripts don't look weird.

**Comment**, Chair DuPuis: That can be part of the motion to approve.

**Comment**, VCSA Christine Quintana: Mahalo to the members of the committee for reviewing this policy. Last revised in 2010. Good that we're taking a look. Encourage all to take it back to your constituents.
